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The standard word limit for new submissions to the European Journal of Criminology is 7,000-9,000 words inclusive of footnotes and references, exclusive of figures and tables, to allow for a maximum of 10,000 words after revisions. Articles that differ in length, scope and depth from those we publish will be rejected. Authors should aim for tables and figures to be concise, as the space required for these will be considered by the Editorial Team on a submission by submission basis.

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
