Please read the guidelines in full before submitting your manuscript. Manuscripts not conforming to these guidelines may be returned.

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Manuscript Style, Length, and Format

The style guide for all AERA journals is the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, 7th ed., 2019, available from Order Department, American Psychological Association, P.O. Box 2710, Hyattsville, MD 20784.

Manuscripts should not exceed 40 pages total, including all tables, appendixes, notes, and references. Pages should be numbered consecutively, beginning with the page after the title

page. Manuscripts should be typed for 8½" x 11" paper, in upper and lower case, double-spaced, with 1-inch margins on all sides. The type size should be at least 12 point. Figures and tables are to be embedded in the text near where they are first referenced. Subheads should be placed at reasonable intervals to break the monotony of lengthy text.
